Week 23 – Acts 8:9-25 A Spirit That Humbles Us

We are nearly two-thirds of the way through our verse by verse journey in the first half of the book of Acts. We are slowly making our way through the book of Acts in order to help us better understand the early church, their calling, their ministry, and their mission so we will also be able to use that knowledge to inform us about how a Church should ideally operate.

What do you think of when you think of Magic?

Who is your favorite "magician"?

As we saw last week, Phillip journeyed into the area of Samaria to spread the good news of the message of Jesus. While in Samaria, many people believe in Jesus and get baptized to show their new faith...including a man named Simon who was a magician.

Read Acts 8:9-25.

If you could pinpoint one thing you want from God right now, what would it be?

Simon the Magician did not want Christ's Gospel to change his life; Simon wanted power so he could be great. Acts 8:18-19 says, "Now when Simon saw that the Spirit was given through the laying on of the apostles' hands, he offered them money, saying, "Give me this power also, so that anyone on whom I lay my hands may receive the Holy Spirit."

Have you ever tried to manipulate God to get something?

What/How?

Simon believed that he could buy the Spirit of God; essentially Simon wanted the POWER to give the Spirit, but didn't want the Spirit Himself. Simon missed something of ultimate importance, the Spirit of God is not something that is given by man, it is a gift directly from God.

Have you ever been rebuked? Define "rebuked."

Peter had enough of Simon's flawed theology and laid some hard truth on Simon. Peter says, "May your silver perish with you, because you thought you could obtain the gift of God with money! You have neither part nor lot in this matter, for your heart is not right before God. Repent, therefore, of this wickedness of yours, and pray to the Lord that, if possible, the intent of your heart may be forgiven you. For I see that you are in the gall of bitterness and in the bond of iniquity."

How do you respond when someone calls you out?

Instead of taking responsibility for his own actions, Simon refuses to submit to Jesus. He pleads with Peter to intercede on his behalf before God. Simon does not want to approach God Himself, he wants someone else to own his faith. And Simon answered, "Pray for me to the Lord, that nothing of what you have said may come upon me." Simon won't even pray; he still thinks it is something someone else has to do because Simon doesn't want a relationship with God, he only wants to escape punishment.

Do you believe you can approach God yourself or do you believe someone else needs to communicate with God for you?

Attrition is repentance based on a threat or a consequence (because there is a sword at your throat, a gun at your head). Contrition is where our hearts are truly broken over our sin and having offended a good and holy God. True repentance is not about getting out of trouble, it is recognizing that without Jesus we are all lost.

It is important that we own our mistakes and become humble when rebuked. God's Spirit brings humbleness. If we are not humble, we are not filled with the Spirit. Simon didn't want to be humble, he wanted a power to be great. The real power of God is extended to you as gift, those who believe and receive.

How does owning our mistakes make us more humble?

God's Spirit gives us the vision to see Jesus, He changes our hearts to see the world as He does, and to bring unity to those around us as only He can.
