

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INTRODUCTION:

In this book, you'll find:

GOSPEL TRUTH:

"The Gospel is the good news that..."

Each week we will have a new Gospel Truth (statement) that will be the theme of the week. We will build each week on top of the last to get a fuller and deeper picture of God's work in our lives and in the world.

We hope you memorize it, and eventually are able to put it into your own words. Once you can put it into your own words, sharing the message with others (family members, friends, co-workers) becomes much more natural and real. The Gospel is truly good news for everyone!

Remember, the Gospel is everything, but not everything is the Gospel. The Gospel is the good news for all of life, and we want you to be able to articulate it in real and practical ways.

DAILY DEVOTIONALS

Monday Genesis I:I In the beginning, God created the heavens and the earth. What do you picture existence like before creation?

Sample Daily Devotion. Yep, that's it! Short and sweet. One verse, one question is all you have. Take as much time with it as you'd like; memorize it if you are so inclined. We hope that by the end of the 16 weeks you have a hunger for the word and a desire to dive deeper (and do longer devotions) on your own!

There will be six simple verse and question devotions for each week, Monday through Saturday. We skip Sunday due to it being the beginning of the new week, with a new message, and you will hopefully be in services to grow deeper together with others. Each week we will provide sermon notes, discussion questions and prayer points that go along with that Sunday's message. We



encourage all of our Gospel Communities to work through these questions each week to help process and apply these Gospel Truths to our lives.

At the end of each night, take some time to pray together as a community through the list of prayer bullet lists provided.

If you are not in a Gospel Community, that's ok! Get together with some of your friends or family and work through the questions with them. Our goal is to help grow every relationship you are in to be more gospel-centered.



Each week, Aaron will provide the entire congregation with a Gospel Statement to help you define and apply the Gospel to your everyday

lives. In these devotionals provided for your family, we've reworded the statement so that your entire family can be on the same page, and you can practice living those statements out together.

Included in this booklet are questions to answer as a family. These questions are designed to help your youngest members apply the Gospel to life lessons and also help your teens think more deeply. We want to help you to start spiritual conversations with your kids. **The questions in blue are children's questions, red indicates questions for teens, and questions in black are appropriate for your entire family to mull over.**

Our prayer is that you use the family devotions as a tool to start a habit that will last the rest of your lives as you speak Gospelcentered truth to one another.



The Bible is not just a list of rules to obey, stories to be inspired by, or morals to live your life by. Sure, the Bible contains rules, stories, and morality, but it is so much more than just these things. It is the true story of the world. It is a divine drama. It is a dramatic six-act play.

In their book <u>The Drama of Scripture</u> Mike Goheen and Craig Bartholomew offer a clarifying warning:

Many of us have read the Bible as if it were merely a mosaic of little bits – theological bits, moral bits, historical-critical bits, sermon bits, devotional bits. But when we read the Bible in such a fragmented way, we ignore its divine author's intention to shape our lives through it's story. All human communities live out of some story that provides a context for understanding the meaning of history and gives shape and direction to their lives. If we allow the Bible to become fragmented, it is in danger of being absorbed into whatever other story is shaping our culture, and it will thus cease to shape our lives as it should.

Idolatry has twisted the dominant cultural story of the secular Western world. If as believers we allow this story (rather than the Bible) to become the foundation of our thought and action, then our lives will manifest not the truths of Scripture, but the lies of an idolatrous culture. Hence, the unity of Scripture is no minor matter: a fragmented Bible may actually produce theologically orthodox, morally upright, warmly pious idol worshippers!

The 6 symbols above help us to identify the 6 acts of the Divine Drama. This is a useful tool for making the overarching story stick. After the symbols you will find our short telling of the True Story. We've chosen a few threads in this telling that are helpful for people to get an overview of the Bible.

In the beginning God created the heavens and the earth.

God, the main character of this story, is the personal, all-powerful being who made everything that exists. He is the true ruler of the universe — lovingly providing for all that is under His care.

The kingdom, or sphere of authority, that God set up was not restricted to the heavens; but God powerfully, intentionally, and creatively spoke all of creation into existence:

- He precisely laid the foundations of the earth.
- He intentionally separated the waters from the land, filling that land with beautiful flowers and unique animals.
- He splashed His creative canvas with many colors and fragrances that all declared His worth.

In five days, God masterfully set up a physical kingdom that was separate from Him, yet uniquely and personally cared for by Him. At the end of each day, God reflected on His work saying, "It is good."

On the sixth day, God created the first people. God said, "Let us make man in our image," and He formed the dust of the ground together and breathed into it the breath of life. Thus, the first humans were created and placed in a perfect garden where they could enjoy the good reign of this God. The people were decidedly different than the rest of creation in that they were given the responsibility of caring for the creation. God spoke to this first man, Adam, and told him to enjoy all that He had created: the animals, the flavors, the sights, and the work. Adam and all the humans were created with the ability to enjoy this wonderful environment God had fashioned. And they were created with the great task of reflecting the King's goodness and greatness throughout all of creation.

God also made it clear to Adam that there were two trees in the center of the garden. One was the tree of life. The fruit from this tree was to be enjoyed and eaten just like the rest of the trees. The other tree, known as the knowledge of good and evil, was the only tree they were not to eat from. If Adam was to eat of this tree, he would surely die. This conversation between Adam and God continued as God described what it should look like for Adam to live in this garden. Adam had responsibilities to cultivate the garden and name the animals, operating under God's authority to cultivate the world.

Adam went about the work God gave him to do. As he worked, God said that it was not good for man to be alone—he needed a helper. So God caused a deep sleep to come over Adam, and by taking a rib from his side, He created a woman named Eve for Adam to enjoy, love, protect, care for, and work alongside in relationship. When Adam woke up he broke into poetry and declared how amazed he was by what God had created. This first marriage was enjoyed without shame and guilt. They were naked in every sense and not the least bit afraid of rejection. God commissioned both the man and the woman with the task of cultivating the potential in His creation and to multiplying their family by having kids. After the sixth day and the creation of man in His own image, God reflected, "It is very good!"

Then on the seventh day God rested and reflected on the goodness of His creation. This was not the end of God's relationship with His creation, but rather it was only the beginning. Each day God would come down in the cool of the day and talk with Adam and Eve, teaching them the best possible way to live life, and showing them how to live under His good reign. Adam and Eve were able to enjoy both the goodness and greatness of their Creator and His creation. They worked faithfully in the garden, cultivating it and developing its potential to bring glory to God. They lived in perfect harmony in their relationships with God, His world, and each other. This truly was a good Kingdom!

DAILY DEVOTIONALS

Monday

Genesis 1:1 In the beginning, God created the heavens and the earth. What do you picture existence like before creation?

Tuesday

Genesis I:I In the beginning, God created the heavens and the earth. What does it mean for human life that God is the creator and that all of creation is not by chance or luck?

Wednesday

Genesis 1:26b "And let them have dominion over the fish of the sea and over the birds of the heavens and over the livestock and over all the earth and over every creeping thing that creeps on the earth." How do you exercise stewardship and responsibility for the things under your care?

Thursday

Genesis 1:26a Then God said, "Let us make man in our image, after our likeness. How have you understood being "made in the image of God?"

Friday

Genesis I:27 So God created man in his own image, in the image of God he created him; male and female he created them. Why do you think God made us male and female?

Saturday

John 13:35 By this all men will know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another."

How does being made in God's image lend itself to learning to love one another?



This week, we kick off our new series exploring the story of the Gospel throughout the entirety of Scripture. Starting a new sermon series is a great opportunity to re-engage with your GC. Are there people that have expressed interest in checking out your GC? Others who maybe haven't participated in a while? You may want to plan a fun event to reconnect and generate interest in the weeks ahead.

Being "Gospel" Communities, we want to help each other grow in our understanding and application of the Gospel, and this series is designed to help us explore and appreciate the many facets of the Gospel message. How do you currently define the Gospel? How do you feel when you think about sharing it with others? {Address the fears/ insecurities that are common and encourage your group...we are all here to grow together.}

This week's sermon is about the Bible's creation account, so *what stands out to you within the first couple chapters of Genesis?* This may elicit speculation about scientific details (age of the earth, dinosaurs, etc.), which you can briefly discuss, but try to refocus your GC on the main points of this account. For example: God existed before the world began, He created everything from nothing, we are image bearers of God, and

age have GC? in a ht to eeks and spel the bout fears/ your ble's we are called to be stewards of creation. It's a good opportunity to discuss how we can often get bogged down by details and miss the point of the Scriptures.

Aaron shared a quote from John Calvin in the message: "As a mirror reflects an image, so man is to reflect God." *How is the image of God distorted in our culture today? How have we lost our humanity as God intended it to be?* Talk about the ways we can live counterculturally and embrace our calling as image bearers of God...and share that calling with those around us. *What kind of impact would that have on our families? Our communities? Our world?* This is also a good opportunity to encourage your group in the ways they already display the image of God. *{Take some time to affirm them individually and/or collectively.}*

We also learned about how humans have a special, unique role in creation; we are to have dominion over the earth. Encourage the group to think about what dominion looks like for them. What things are you are a steward of? How are you caring for those things right now?

PRAYER

- Ask God to deepen your understanding of the Gospel over the next few weeks
- Thank God for giving us dignity and worth by making us in His image
- Ask how we can better reflect His image where He has placed us
- Thank God for the gift of stewardship—for entrusting people/things to our care
- Ask God how we can be stewards that demonstrate His character

1: In His Image



Gospel Statement

The Gospel is the good news that Jesus (who is God) came to restore and renew every person into who He meant for them to be – His image bearers who serve and love others.

Family **Questions**

- 1. Does bearing God's image mean that to look like Jesus we need to change our appearance–like our faces, clothes, and hair? Or does it mean something else?
- 2. If to bear His image means to reflect Jesus' character to others around us, are we doing that as a family? What can we change today to be better bearers of Jesus' image?
- 3. How can you bear that image in school? At work?
- 4. As a family, make a list of people to whom you can serve and minister. Make a plan that includes everyone, as well as a deadline to begin.

Conversation Starter

Talk about how you struggle with bearing God's image. In your family, how can you keep each other accountable to be better image bearers of God?



"Did God really say that you couldn't eat of any of the fruit in this garden?"

...Asked a deceitful, lying serpent who one day approached Eve. Eve told him, "No, that's not what God said. We can eat from any tree in the garden. It's only the tree of the knowledge of good and evil that we are not allowed to eat from—or even touch—or we will definitely die."

The serpent lied to Eve and said, "You won't die! God just knows that as soon as you eat from that tree your eyes will be opened, and you will become just like Him. You will be able to determine what is right and wrong for yourselves."

"Hmm. I would be able to decide what is right and wrong?" Eve thought. She looked at the delicious fruit, contemplating the decision, and she believed the lies of the serpent over the words of the good God. She reached out her hand and ate some of the fruit. Then she gave some to her husband, Adam, who was there with her, and he ate it as well. In that moment their eyes were opened, and they were flooded with guilt and shame. They quickly tied fig leaves together to cover up their nakedness. They had rebelled and chosen to live outside the good reign of God and were immediately experiencing the devastating effects of that choice.

Later on that day, Adam and Eve heard God walking in the garden as He always did that time of day. When they heard Him,

their shame caused them to try to hide behind some of the nearby bushes.

God called out to them, "Adam, where are you?" Ashamed, Adam answered, "I heard you coming, and I was afraid because I was naked." God asked, "Who told you that you were naked? Did you eat the fruit that I told you not to?" Adam replied to God, "It was that woman that you gave to me... she handed me the fruit." Then God said to Eve, "How could you do this?" And Eve said, "The serpent tricked me into eating the fruit."

So God spoke to the serpent, "You are cursed because you have done this. You will now be the enemy of the woman and her offspring. You will bite at his heels, but he will crush your head!"

Then God turned to Adam and Eve. He knew that His good creation would be drastically affected by their choice to live outside His good reign. He knew that they would be subjected to sickness, pain, suffering, and even death now as a result of their decisions. Because He is just and good and cannot allow injustice or rebellion to remain in His presence forever, He had to punish them for their rebellion.

He told them the consequences of their sin:

- Women will have great pain in bearing children.
- Men will struggle, toil, and sweat while trying to cultivate the land—only to get a little bit of food from it.
- They would both struggle for power in their relationship.
- They would die and return to the dust from which they were formed.

Even though He punished them with the consequences for their rebellion, God still loved and provided for them. He gave them clothes made from the skins of animals that they had previously named and cared for.

God sent Adam and Eve out of the garden and then sent mighty warrior angels to guard its entrance so that they would not be able to re-enter it. He also put a flaming sword in place to guard the Tree of Life so that people could no longer eat from it. God's good creation was now a drastically different place, twisted and distorted from how He had made it.



Now, what you have to understand is that the story doesn't end with the rebellion in the garden. Like any good story, there is hope. And the hope of this story lies in the promise that God is still on His mission.

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In the midst of the realization that all of creation was now under a curse, Adam and Eve held onto that promise that the good God would some day crush the serpent through one of their descendants —a Victor had been promised.

After the disaster in the garden, the rebellion continued to manifest itself. Adam and Eve had two sons. One murdered the other! It got so bad that at one point God looked at the people of the earth and saw the wickedness of man was great in the earth, and that every intention of the thoughts of his heart was only evil. He decided to send a great flood over the entire earth to wipe out this rebellion and wickedness. But God was still on mission.

You see, He didn't wipe out every single human. Noah and his family were rescued from the flood. And after the water subsided, God put a rainbow in the sky and covenanted with Noah promising that He would never again destroy the earth.

You might think that Noah's descendants figured it out and started loving and following God. But the rebellion ran deep. Pride dominated the world. The people came together to build a tower to heaven in order to make a name for themselves and to avoid doing their job of spreading out caring for all of God's creation.

Rather than letting them have their prideful way, God was gracious to them and dispersed them across the earth by confusing their language. God was still on His mission.

DAILY DEVOTIONALS

Monday

Genesis 2:7 then the Lord God formed the man of dust from the ground and breathed into his nostrils the breath of life, and the man became a living creature. How does it feel to know that you are a God-breathed creation?

Tuesday

Genesis 2:16 And the Lord God commanded the man, saying, "You may surely eat of every tree of the garden, but of the tree of the knowledge of good and evil you shall not eat, for in the day that you eat of it you shall surely die." What things have you "eaten" that have brought you death?

Wednesday

Genesis 3:6-7 So when the woman saw that the tree was good for food, and that it was a delight to the eyes, and that the tree was to be desired to make one wise, she took of its fruit and ate, and she also gave some to her husband who was with her, and he ate. Then the eyes of both were opened, and they knew that they were naked. How has a sin in your life opened your eyes to the truth of your own failing?

Thursday

Genesis 3:15 "I will put enmity between you and the woman, and between your offspring and her offspring; he shall bruise your head, and you shall bruise his heel." What do you think today, now knowing that at this moment Jesus promised to come HIMSELF and fix our sin problem?

Friday

2 Corinthians 5:21 For our sake he made him to be sin who knew no sin, so that in him we might become the righteousness of God. What does it mean for you to have Jesus' righteousness placed upon you?

Saturday

I Corinthians 15:22 For as in Adam all die, so also in Christ shall all be made alive. What does a new life lived for Christ look like?



This week we delved into the Fall in Genesis 3, where we see the tov (good) and shalom (peace) God created disrupted by sin. It is a tragic contrast to the paradise described in the first couple chapters of Genesis, with the consequences still seen today. As bleak as sin and death are, we can know that God's work entails restoration, renewal, and reconciliation through Jesus, and that is the hope of the Gospel.

Encourage your group to really engage with this section of Scripture. Ask them what emotions come up as they hear this story. What would it feel like to live in perfect harmony and have all that destroyed? How does it feel knowing Adam and Eve had peaceful, uninhibited access to God and rebelled anyway? It can be deeply frustrating to see how Adam and Eve's rebellion plays out and affects all of humanity, and yet, we are often guilty of the same distrust in God's intent for us. How have you followed your own desires, rather than trust God's will. What was the result?

As we learned in the message, death is more than a biological process. It involves separation from life and God (the source of true life).

How have you personally experienced separation resulting from death? (Maybe it's through the death of a loved one, the despair of being at odds with God or others, etc).

It may be a heavy conversation at first, but take time to discuss the hope found in *Genesis 3:15: "I will put enmity between you and the woman, and between your offspring and her offspring; he shall bruise your head, and you shall bruise his heel.*" Even in this moment of crisis, God promises to make things right through Jesus' defeat of Satan, sin, and death. Not only does He set out to defeat our enemies, but He also promises to restore humanity to how He created us to be.

If we miss the significance of the Gospel, we can minimize it to an escape plan from a decaying world. *Is that how your group has viewed the Gospel up until now?* With what we learned last week in the creation account, *what would look like for the world to be restored to how God created it? How does that change or deepen the Gospel message? How does it change how we live today?*

PRAYER:

- Acknowledge the hurt, frustration, and brokenness that has resulted from the Fall
- Confess your own areas of rebellion against God
- Thank God for His fulfilled promise to undo the Fall and restore creation
- Ask God for opportunities to demonstrate hope in the midst of a broken world, and for clarity on how to articulate the good news of the Gospel

2: Flesh Fall



Gospel Statement

The Gospel is the good news that Jesus Himself has come into the brokenness humanity created; He died for what separated us from God, others, and life. He has promised to renew all things, including us.

Family **Questions**

- 1. Take a magnifying glass and any object (like fabric, skin, or hair) and look at it with your children - once with the magnifying glass, and once without. Explain that that is kind of what is happening in this week's section of Scripture. There is a macro and micro view of creation.
- 2. What are some things that are bad to have knowledge about or "know" from experience? What are some things or events that you really aren't better off with knowledge of?
- 3. Why is it frustrating to be told that we don't need to know something? How do you feel when there is something in Scripture that you really can't get a definitive answer about?
- 4. What is the biblical definition of death? What would it be like to be separated from God and each other for eternity?

Conversation Starter

Talk about some things in Scripture and life that you don't understand, that you may never understand this side of heaven. **Suggest strategies to each other on how to deal with those questions.**

GOSPEL TRUTH:

DAILY DEVOTIONALS

Monday

Genesis 6:5 The Lord saw that the wickedness of man was great in the earth, and that every intention of the thoughts of his heart was only evil continually. How is our world a lot like Noah's world?

Tuesday

Genesis 6:8 But Noah found favor in the eyes of the LORD. What do you think it means that Noah received favor (this is the Hebrew word for "grace"), before he was called "righteous"?

Wednesday

Genesis 8:20 Then Noah built an altar to the Lord and took some of every clean animal and some of every clean bird and offered burnt offerings on the altar.

What would you do as your first act after getting off the Ark?

Thursday

Genesis 9:8-9 Then God said to Noah and to his sons with him, "Behold, I establish my covenant with you and your offspring after цои, ...

What does it mean that God initiates a covenant with us?

Friday

Ephesians 5:2 ...Christ loved us and gave himself up for us, a fragrant offering and sacrifice to God. What type of offering would you say your life is to God?

Saturday

2 Corinthians 5:21 (NIV) God made him who had no sin to be sin for us, so that in him we might become the righteousness of God. How does God's covenant eventually result in Jesus coming for us?



Gospel Statement

The Gospel is the good news that even though we make everything about us, Jesus comes to us and changes us so that we can live for Him. He invites us to be part of His plan of serving others, even though we don't deserve it. That is what we call Jesus' grace

Family **Questions**

- 1. What is sin? What are God's feelings about sin? Are some sins worse than others?
- 2. Why do you suppose we tend to downplay our own sins? If you had been alive in Noah's time and were saved through God's mercy, do you think you would look at your sin differently?
- 3. What is the difference between God being fair and God being good? Do we want God to be fair?
- 4. What is grace?

Conversation Starter

Talk about a lesson you had to learn the hard way. What changes did you make as a result of that lesson?



The story of the flood can conjure mixed emotions because it entails so much death and so much grace at the same time. It is part of our favorite Sunday School stories, probably because of the animals and *not* the fact that, essentially, all of humanity dies. The story of the flood introduces us to three theological constructs:

- Total depravity: Which means our thoughts, actions, and lives are corrupted and stained by the sin of the fall.
- Grace: That God gives us favor because He is good, not because our actions are worthy of praise.
- A covenant-keeping God: That God remembers us and cares for us.

Discuss with your GC your thoughts/feelings about the flood account. If your group feels safe, discuss questions regarding the validity of the flood-how can a good God kill all of humanity?

It is important to acknowledge these questions and the emotions behind them; allow questions to arise in the discussion and don't feel pressured to silence or disregard them. However, make sure to redirect discussion back to the goodness of God. If discussion gets too off-track, remind them that it is because of God's grace that we are even here and able to have such conversations! Genesis 6:5 says, "The Lord saw that the wickedness of man was great in the earth, and that every intention of the thoughts of his heart was only evil continually." What are your thoughts on total depravity? Is it a concept that resonates with you? How has your sin separated you from others and/or God. What is your understanding of grace? Try to have those who answer provide personal examples of grace in their lives, and then encourage others to share.

The flood narrative is a story of grace. The goodness of God did not leave us in brokenness, but instead offered us hope for renewal when we would have otherwise been desperate. This story shows us that God mourns our condition of sin and depravity, and He takes action to restore us to who He calls us to be.

As a group, imagine what it would be like to be on the ark, for over a year, adrift at sea. Have you ever felt like God has forgotten you? While Noah was on the ark, he probably felt that way at times, but we read that God remembered Noah and all the other creatures that were with him in the ark. How has God remembered you?

Remember that: The Gospel is the good news that though the inclination of our hearts is bent toward ourselves and our own glory, Jesus has come to us in grace and love to restore us to live for His glory; He invites us into His mission, which refocuses us to live and usher in the Kingdom of God.

PRAYER

- Thank God for grace
- Ask God to help you see the grace that has been bestowed upon your life
- Ask God to help you to see where others need grace around you
- Pray for one another in the places where you feel God has forgotten you
- Thank God that in Christ He has never left or forsaken us

ACT THREE: PROMISE

"God is our Savior and will keep His covenant with us!"

God did not just leave the nations to be confused and without hope forever, but He called one man, Abraham, and made a covenant with him. The covenant stated that God would bless Abraham and multiply his offspring so that his offspring would be a blessing to all the nations. Abraham's family would be the means by which God would cure the world.

After many years of waiting, Abraham had a child named Isaac. In one of the most dramatic scenes in the Bible, Abraham was instructed by God to sacrifice Isaac, the child of promise. But at the last moment, God provided a ram for the sacrifice instead. The ram was substituted for Isaac, and the promise continued.

Isaac multiplied into a great nation called Israel. As generations passed, Israel became enslaved to the Egyptians, the strongest nation in the world. They were beaten, abused, mistreated and hopeless. They cried out in misery to God, and God heard their cries for help.

He rescued them by His mighty hand, using a man named Moses. This exodus from Egypt was the great act of God that Israel would always look back on to remember, "God is our Savior and will keep His covenant with us!"

Soon after they were rescued from slavery, God spoke to Moses on a mountaintop and told him the commandments they were to live by. However, just like Adam and Eve, the people of Israel didn't always obey these commandments. Because God always does what is good, right and perfect, He could not overlook their sins and the ultimate punishment for sin was death. A life must be given to pay for each person's disobedience. But God loved His people, so He provided a way for them to substitute the life of an innocent animal in place of their own. This pattern of an innocent life of a lamb being substituted for sin would continue long into the future.

You might think that after being rescued out of slavery, Israel would be the people who finally abandon their rebellion against God. But that wasn't the case. As they journeyed to the land God had promised them, they began grumbling against God. They even wished they could go back to their slavery in Egypt. At one point, they took all their gold jewelry, melted it down and made a golden calf to be their god. But even their rebellion could not thwart God; He was still on His mission to restore and redeem His creation.

After forty years, God raised up a man named Joshua to finally lead Israel out of the wilderness and into the beautiful land God had promised to them. God had rescued them out of slavery and into the safety of their own land.

You might think now that Israel was safe in their land, they would break the legacy of rebellion against God. Rather than worshipping the true God, they quickly fell into a devastating cycle of rebellion against God. Over the next centuries, they would fall further and further away from the God who had rescued and delivered them. But God was still on His mission.

Even though God had shown Himself to be a good King, the people cried out for a human king. So God gave them kings. One such king was David. David ruled well and brought the nation together. As David was about to die, God made a covenant with David that one of his sons would reign over God's people forever.

David's sons did not follow after their father, and they certainly did not follow God. They turned to the many gods of the other nations and led the people away from God. Because of their rebellion, God brought other nations in to conquer and exile Israel from their land. All seemed lost. But God was still on mission.

In the midst of the exile, God spoke through prophets. He gave them a great promise that He would one day come and rescue His people. He would send a mighty, yet humble Servant to redeem them.

And so, God's people were left, waiting, longing, and hoping for the day when God would rescue them.



GOSPEL TRUTH:

"The Gospel is the good news that God has remembered us in our lost state and has come to redeem, rename, and restore us from our brokenness to be in renewed, life-giving relationship with Him and others."

In our series about the Gospel, <u>Didn't See</u> <u>That Coming</u>, we just finished the flood narrative, which is designed to show us that God gives us grace when we don't deserve it. It is to serve as a reminder that we are sinful and prone to forgetting the good and loving character of God. This week, we talk about people messing up *again* and forgetting God's promises to His people; once more, God displays His graciousness by blessing them anyway.

What do you do when you think God has forgotten you? How does this affect your daily lives and the people around you? Do you believe that God is trustworthy? If God makes a promise, is it safe to believe He will keep it?

God comes to Abraham and makes a promise that he will have a son, this son will set off a chain of descendants that ultimately results in God's Son, the world's redeemer, Jesus. Abraham doesn't understand all of this, but trusts God anyway and leaves home to go to the place that God leads him.

Which of God's promises do you tend to doubt? What does this reveal about your own heart? We can often be stuck in unbelief and blind to the lies that cloud our vision of reality and who God is. Don't be afraid to speak up, as a group, and challenge the assumptions behind unbelief. After two decades of trusting God's promises, Abraham has his promised son, Isaac. Isaac later has a son named Jacob, and God changes his name to Israel. Before changing his name, however, God wrestles with Jacob (Israel) to show him that He will bless and prosper him despite Jacob's past disobedience which leads directly to Israel becoming the father of the twelve tribes of Israel, the nation of God's people.

What are some of the ways God grows us in life? What are some past experiences you can share?

God used every circumstance in Abraham's, Isaac's, and Jacob's lives to conform them to people of dignity and purpose. Even for us today, everything that comes to us is either from, or has passed through, God's hands. In the midst of hardship, we should ask ourselves what we can learn about God's character, and what promises remain true in spite of the suffering. The Gospel reminds us that it is God's remembrance of us that saves us all; though we may feel far away, He never loses us. Through His death and resurrection, Jesus has bound Himself to us for eternity, and nothing can threaten that promise.

We all go through periods of life where we struggle to see the larger picture of what God is doing or how any good can possibly come of a hardship. *If anyone in your GC is in such a place, take some time to reaffirm to them some of the promises God has made.*

PRAYER

- Thank God that He is always faithful to His promises
- Ask Jesus to reveal to you His continuing promises for you
- Ask God to help you through any trial you are facing by reminding you of His steadfast promises
- Thank God for the ways He has grown you and what He has taught you during hardship
- Talk to one another about what you are struggling through, ask them to pray for you.
- Thank God for community that can come around you and walk with you through hardship

4: Call, Promise, Abraham



Gospel Statement

The Gospel is the good news that God sees us when we wander, and Jesus comes to call us His family, and brings us back so that we can live life with Him and with others in a godly way.

Family **Questions**

- 1. When the Bible says, "God remembered," does that mean God had forgotten something? Can God ever lose us, or do we wander away and get lost?
- 2. How are you as a family "remembering" God in your lives?
- 3. Why does God use us in His plans?
- 4. Can we trust God and His promises? What does that look like in the context of our lives?
- 5. If God were to rename each of you based on your relationship with Him, what would that name be?

Conversation Starter

Talk about the difference between doubt and unbelief. Discuss times when you have had doubts (maybe even now). What did you do or what would you have done differently during those times?

"The Gospel is the Good news that God has established His Kingdom that cannot be shaken and has restored for us citizenship in that Kingdom where we now live in a present and tangible way which helps bring that Kingdom to this earth."

5: Redemption/ Exodus



Gospel Statement

The Gospel is the good news that God has a plan and changes us, so that we can be part of that plan by serving and loving Him in practical and visible ways to those around us.

Family **Questions**

- 1. How can we live amid a sinful world and yet still reflect God's image?
- 2. What happens when a baby cries out to its parents? How do you think that is similar to how God responds to us when we are sad?
- 3. How is your family contributing to the cries of this world through your everyday life, purchases, and decisions?

Conversation Starter

Talk about the difference between isolating yourself from the culture around you and living in culture with the intention of redeeming it.



This week, we rocketed out of the book of Genesis and plunged into the Exodus story, where we learn of the Israelites' enslavement by the Egyptian people. During this horrible time of oppression, the Israelites cry out to God and God hears their cry and is moved to action. This is a remarkable picture of an empathetic God that is active in our redemption, and it is a powerful theme that is presented throughout Scripture.

In the first four weeks of this sermon series, we began to understand that sin does not just pertain to individuals. Sin is something that moves from the individual to a society at large, and that is how the stage is set for the Exodus. We see the atrocities of systemic evil at work, and a redeemer is desperately needed to rescue those harmed by sin.

The Gospel statement this week is: "The Gospel is the good news that God has established His Kingdom that cannot be shaken, and we, as restored citizens, live in a present and tangible way that helps bring this Kingdom to earth."

How have you seen glimpses of this Kingdom? How can you live to demonstrate what this Kingdom is about to those around you?

36

Read Exodus 3:7-8 and talk about those times where you have cried out to God. Describe what you felt and whether or not you felt heard by God.

This passage gives us a picture of an active God—one who cares, and promises to redeem us; we don't have a God who leaves us in our suffering, but one that promises He will save. *As a group, talk about these aspects of God's character. As His image bearers, are we mirroring His character to the world around us? Where can our ears and hearts be opened to acknowledge and respond to suffering and oppression? How can we communicate the truth of a God that longs to rescue people from darkness?*

PRAYER

- Praise and thank God for His nature and desire to end injustice and suffering
- Spend some time crying out to God and asking for redemption
- Ask God to open your eyes, ears, and hearts to the cries of the world
- Ask God to assist you in partnering with Him to further His Kingdom

GOSPEL TRUTH:

"The Gospel is the good news that through Jesus' rescue and redemption of mankind, we are sent to be His message of redemption to the world."

DAILY DEVOTIONALS

Monday

Do you see your life as being connected to God today? How?

Tuesday

Ex 19:3 *while* Moses went up to God. The LORD called to him out of the mountain, saying, "Thus you shall say to the house of Jacob, and tell the people of Israel:

Have you ever felt God calling you to something? What? How did He do it?

Wednesday

Exodus 19:4 'You yourselves have seen what I did to the Egyptians, and how I bore you on eagles' wings and brought you to myself. How have you seen God come to rescue you?

Thursday

This promise of being treasured is also given to believers in the New Testament. What does it mean to be treasured by God?

This week we continued to look at the Exodus story. So far, we have learned about people's ruin, the culture of death, and the restoration by the power of the Gospel. We heard about God delivering His people out of Egypt, and this week, we talk about God leading His people to a place called Sinai, which is on the way to their country. (This is all due to God's grace and no one saw it coming).

Encourage your GC to reflect on the idea of grace for a moment. *What do you think your purpose is? How do ideas of purpose vary or seem similar among your group?*

What comes to mind when you think of a priest?

Read Exodus 19:3-6.

We learned this week that God called His people into a vocation of being priests to the world. As the priesthood of all believers, we are to bring the entire world back to who they are called to be. Being a priest means that we put God on display. Who, or what, do you reflect or display in your daily life? Do you feel if people looked at your life they would understand who God is?

God tells His people who they should be by providing them the 10 commandments in a place called Sinai. Sinai is important because God invites the people to meet with Him *and* be His message—with their redemption and rescue being the message they are to deliver. God says GO and be a kingdom of priests (didn't see that coming)

To some, it might seem strange that an all-powerful God would use people to be the main vehicle of His message, considering our human limitations. *What are the possible reasons why God invites us to participate in His mission with Him? How does God's mission change and shape us?*

Gospel Statement: "The gospel is the good news that through Jesus' rescue and redemption of mankind, we are sent to be His message of redemption to the world."

What do you think God's plan is to deal with worldly suffering? What is your role? How can you be a priest in your daily life? How can you practically love others like God loves you?

PRAYER:

- Thank God that He has partnered with His people to be part of the message of hope
- Ask God to reveal to you what message you are sending with your life
- Ask God to help you understand better the love of Jesus in how you live out the Gospel
- Thank God by listing some ways God has been a practical help in your life

7: King That Wasn't God



Gospel Statement

The Gospel is the good news that God is King! He has changed us so that we can show everyone around us how great a King He is.

Family **Questions**

- 1. Draw a picture of a king interacting with His subjects. Is that how God acts as our King? What meaning can we glean from this in regards to our lives?
- 2. Who are the kings at your school? The peasants? How could the entire dynamic of the school change if you treated all the students the same.
- 3. How often do you change how you look or act in order to "fit in"?

Conversation Starter

Talk about when you were in school. Who were the kings and peasants then? What would you do differently today? Be authentic and tell your kids about your mistakes and your successes with people.



This week, we explored Israel's transition from a theocracy to a nation ruled by a human king. While the entirety of Scripture highlights God's plan for redemption through His people, it's important to remember that Israel exists among many different cultures. These surrounding cultures influenced Israel, resulting in Israel wanting a human king to demonstrate power and influence to the surrounding nations.

This is just one example of how we can often yearn for something outside of what God intends for us. *How has our culture influenced your desires? What do you yearn for? Is it in line with what God desires for His people?*

Despite Israel wanting to be like the surrounding cultures, they were set apart as the people of God. Unlike other nations, Israel knew God had created *all* people in His image, meaning they have dignity and worth. *How is or isn't this lived out today? Are there certain people you place over or under others? What would it look like to treat all people equally?*

It is important to remember that this dignity isn't granted to us because we have earned it; it is because God has made us to be a reflection of who He is. *Discuss the significance of our worth being found in God alone....not our actions, talents, successes, etc.*

Are we living as if this is true, or are we striving to prove our worth?

Read Deuteronomy 17:18-20. While we may not be "kings," each of us has influence over others in some capacity. Where/how do you have influence, and how does this passage speak to that role?

Is your heart "lifted up above" your brothers/sisters? How can we lead and serve humbly where God has placed us?

PRAYER

- Thank God for being a good and gracious King that will never fail us
- Ask God to show you what desires should be surrendered to Him
- Ask God to show you how your GC can affirm the dignity of ALL people
- Ask God to help you remember our worth is found in Him alone, and thank Him that nothing can threaten that
- Thank God for the areas of influence you do have, and ask Him to show you how to be a leader that reflects who He is

"The Gospel is the Good news that even though we have destroyed our lives with our own selfishness, Jesus has come not just to redeem, but restore us to be those who live in His kingdom where He rules and reigns forever."

DAILY DEVOTIONALS

Monday

I Kings 10:96 ...Because the Lord loved Israel forever, he has made you king, that you may execute justice and righteousness. How should a king rule (in your humble opinion)?

Saturday

Revelation 21:3-4 And I heard a loud voice from the throne saying, "Behold the dwelling of God is with man. He will dwell with them, and they will be his people, and God himself will be with them as their God. He will wipe away every tear from their eyes, and death shall be no more, neither shall there be mourning, nor crying, nor pain anymore, for the former things have passed away." What tears from misused freedom will God have to wipe away from your eyes?



This Biblical concept of freedom assumes there is an order and reason as to why we should obey God, because He alone is worthy of obeying, and He alone can guarantee our true freedom; it is called obeisance. This is why the Old Testament writers saw the idea of freedom or joy in the law, even though the law was just a shadow of what was to come. *Have you ever felt less free because of your desires or possessions? What does it mean to live under the reign of God? Does it feel constrictive, or is it freeing?*

A covenant is a means to establish a faithful relationship between two unrelated parties that is bound to a solemn vow. Covenant was

not the imposition of a list to restrict the freedom of people, but rather it was a way to bring peace. The Gospel is about God making a covenant with human beings.

The concept of covenant can seem strange to us, considering our removal from ancient Near Eastern times. Spend some time exploring this concept with your GC and asking them about their understanding of covenant, since it is so important to understanding God's relationship with us.

This week we learned about King Solomon, who did not live in accordance with God's command and did not fully trust Him. Instead of living as God instructed, Solomon enslaved people, became an arms dealer, and "loved" many women (700 wives and 300 concubines, according to the text). Solomon did this out of selfish desire, and was trying to make his own name great.

How do you subject yourself to your own ego?

The Gospel is the good news that Jesus has come not just to redeem us from our own selfishness, but to restore us to be citizens of His kingdom where He rules and reigns forever. This statement is not to say, "Yeah, my neighbor will be sorry for not believing in Jesus." It is to remind us that we are JUST LIKE that very neighbor we don't like, and yet Jesus' grace has saved us. We now have the privilege of NOT ending up like Solomon; we are free to celebrate the Good News of our salvation and proclaim freedom for all those held in bondage. Jesus reminds us that our own hearts without Him become like Israel, divided and lost...but He has come to make us whole again. That is the Gospel.

PRAYER

- Thank God for His loving restoration of His people (including you)
- Ask God to reveal where we are enslaved by our selfishness and to free us from that
- Ask Jesus to reveal what he has freed us for
- Ask God for a better understanding of who He is



Gospel Statement

The Gospel is the good news that even though we are selfish and mess everything up, Jesus still wants to save us and change us to be part of His family, where He will forever be the leader.

Family Questions

- 1. Draw a picture of New Jerusalem. Parents, explain this concept to your kids.
- 2. Define freedom. Does this definition change if we define it according to God's plan?
- 3. What is a covenant? What is so spectacular about our God and how He covenants with us?

FROM CREATION TO RESTORATION: INTERLUDE

First the Babylonians, then the Persians, then the Greeks, and finally the Romans- for centuries these empires had, deported, exiled, minimized, and enslaved God's people, the Israelites', and God didn't seem to do anything to stop them!

Would God answer? Would He rescue? After all...

- He promised Adam that He would send one to make things right.
- He promised Noah He would never destroy the earth.
- He promised Abraham that his descendants, the people of Israel, would be blessed.
- He rescued their ancestors out of slavery in Egypt.
- He blessed them and gave them the land through Joshua.
- He promised David a son who would rule forever.
- He promised to rescue His people out of exile.

For over 400 years they were waiting... longing... hoping... for God to rescue.

God's people began looking for the Messiah, a man sent by God, to be their King. Over and over, their hopes would rise with a great political figure or some powerful revolutionary. But over and over, the self-proclaimed would-be-Messiahs failed. Over and over, their hopes were dashed.

This was beginning to seem like a story in search of an ending.



Conversation Starter

Think about the world we will live in when Jesus restores it to how it was originally meant to be. What will that look like? Have each family member describe it, as well as what you see as your role in this new world.

ACT FOUR: REDEMPTION

There is good news! No more waiting, no more longing, no more hoping in false Messiahs! Jesus is Here!

But God was still on His mission. On a quiet night in Bethlehem, the same city King David had grown up in a millennium before, a little child was born. The child's name was Jesus, a translation of Joshua into the local language. On the night this child was born, a myriad of angels came to herald, or to welcome, this child into the world. These weren't pudgy little baby angels with harps. They were mighty warrior angels who had come to announce the arrival of the one and true King to the world. All they could say in utter worship was, "Glory to God in the highest!"

That baby grew into a man. Around the time He was 30 years old, He began to tell people that He was the King they had been waiting for. He told people, "There is good news! No more waiting, no more longing, no more hoping in false Messiahs! Repent, for the Kingdom of God is at hand now."

Jesus began teaching people what life was going to be like under the rule of this true King in His forever Kingdom. He not only taught people how to live in this Kingdom, but He gave them a foretaste of what the Kingdom is like:

- In His Kingdom, there is no blindness. He gave sight to the blind.
- In His Kingdom, there is no sickness. He healed the sick.
- In His Kingdom, there is no sin. He forgave sin.
- In His Kingdom, there are no marginalized people.
- 54 He befriended sinners.

- In His Kingdom, there are no evil powers. He cast out demons.
- In His Kingdom, nature is at peace. He calmed the storm.
- In His Kingdom, there is no death. He raised the dead.

Many people followed Jesus. They wanted to be a part of this kind of Kingdom. They were starting to believe that He was finally God's answer to their longings. Of the many people who followed Him, He selected twelve disciples He would train to carry out His mission after He left. These men dropped everything to follow Jesus on His way to the throne. They believed Jesus was going to overturn the Romans, set God's people free, and bring in the golden age of peace. They wanted to be near. So they followed Jesus. They loved Jesus. They learned from Jesus. They served Jesus.

But not everyone loved Jesus. To the Jewish leaders, He was a rebel, flipping their religious system upside down after they had worked so hard to build it up. To the Romans, He was a rebel, an insurrectionist. To make matters worse, He claimed He was God. So, needless to say, not everyone loved Jesus.

After three years of proclaiming the Kingdom and setting Himself up as the promised King, the true Messiah, Jesus came into Jerusalem (the City of David) to celebrate the Passover. The Passover was the holiday when the people of Israel remembered God's great saving act of rescuing them out of Egyptian slavery centuries before. Many people welcomed Jesus into the city, believing He was the King who would do the next great saving act of rescuing them out of Roman slavery.

Some of the religious leaders made a plan to murder Jesus. They conspired with Judas, one of Jesus' twelve disciples, exactly how it would go down. They turned Him over to the Romans calling Him an insurrectionist. They demanded He, the one and true King of the earth, be beaten and killed. Not just killed, but crucified. Crucifixion is one of the most torturous, humiliating, and excruciating deaths ever devised.

So on a little hill outside Jerusalem they crucified Jesus. The one and true King of the world was being murdered. Hanging on a cross was the One many had been hoping, waiting, longing for. John looked on in horror. The King willingly hung on a cross and died... according to plan.



GOSPEL TRUTH:

"The Gospel is the good news that our God has called us out of the slavery we have placed ourselves in and given us a calling, an identity, and a new hope centered in the person of Jesus Christ."

This week, we looked at what Israel lost in their exile and how this affected their hope and expectations of the Messiah. When Israel received a human king they started to behave like the cultures around them, and not like a "set apart" nation (exactly as God said they would). Through this assimilation, their disobedience continued to grow.

We can see examples of this in Israel by how they built war cities, palaces, and even God's temple on the backs of slaves. What do you look like to the culture around you? When was the last time you took a step back and asked if you are a part of the problem in the world or the solution? Explore the ways in which mirroring our surrounding culture can be a good or bad thing.

As a good father, God is serious about discipline, and He used the Babylonians to bring about His discipline of Israel. The Babylonians came and hauled off Israel as slaves, removing them from their homeland. Psalm 137 is a poem of lament, written while Israel is in captivity in Babylon. You can see their despair as they reflect on all that they have lost. *Has anyone ever lost anything because of poor choices? What did that feel like? What hope did you turn to?*

Read Psalm 137 with your GC. Point out all the ways the Psalm expresses Israel's loss:

- Intimacy with God They have been exiled from their land just like Adam and Eve being banished from the garden.
- **Their institutions** Jerusalem, the temple, the ark of God's covenant...all of these were important elements of their daily lives.
- *Power and wealth* It was a confusion and misuse of their power and wealth that brought judgment.

Israel laments and begins to honestly cry out to God. From what we have covered in the last couple of months, we understand that God is a God who hears His people's cries. He will bring His people back and continue to promise a redeemer and messiah. In their desperation, Israel begins to look for a new "Son of David." Isaiah 61 gives the personality profile of what this new son of David will be like **Isaiah 61:1-3** The Spirit of the LORD God is **upon me, because the LORD has anointed me to bring good news** (Gospel) **to the poor.**

Isaiah describes what to look for in the promised redeemer. The true Son of David will also rescue us from our sin, our indifference, and the things that have broken us, so that we can follow Him and truly show the world who God is as His priests. Jesus eventually comes and says Luke 4:18 The Spirit of the Lord is upon me, because he has anointed me to proclaim good news to the poor. He has sent me to proclaim liberty to the captives and recovering of sight to the blind, to set at liberty those who are oppressed... The Gospel is in one word JESUS! What do you want Jesus to set you free from? What has kept you in bondage or has broken you?

PRAYER

- Thank God for hearing the cry of the helpless and lost
- Ask God to help you see the Gospel (good news) in your current circumstances
- Ask Jesus to show you what in your life you should repent and weep over
- Thank God that He has provided a way for peace and goodness to be restored

9: God in Flesh



Gospel Statement

The Gospel is the good news that our God has saved us and given us a new purpose, a new name, and a new hope, because Jesus has shown us mercy.

Family **Questions**

- 1. What happens when you disobey your parents? How do you feel when you are punished for something you did wrong?
- 2. What is your response when you are rebuked? Do you have people in your life that you have given permission to rebuke you in a godly way?
- 3. Why do so many of us dislike discipline? Why do you suppose a good God would discipline us?

GOSPEL TRUTH:

"The Gospel is the good news that though we have lived and walked in darkness, our God has restored us to Himself because of the work of Jesus; He now sends us out to be His light in the world."

Conversation Starter

Talk about a time you were either disciplined, or natural consequences were allowed to occur. Did you make that same mistake again? Talk about boundaries and how loving parents set boundaries to keep their children safe.

10: Light of the World



Gospel Statement

The Gospel is the good news that although we have lived our lives in ways that don't show Jesus, through Jesus' sacrifice on the cross, we are changed and now can live in ways that show Jesus to others.

Family **Questions**

- 1. What does repent mean?
- 2. Would you describe your family as a city on a hill, or as an underground bunker?
- 3. What changes need to be made to become a city on a hill in your family?

Conversation Starter

Review the timeline of LIVE/SIN/DIE that we have covered so far in this series.



This week we talked about God's call in our lives to return to our original purpose, being His image bearers and light in the world. All the prophets God sent included a "return" as part of their message. This return was a call to come home and be restored (just like the story of the Prodigal Son in Luke 15); this theme is consistent with the entirety of Scripture.

The Gospel is news about a history-, world-, and life-changing event that affects everyone. *As a group, discuss what is wrong with the following statement:* "Christians are a group of people who believe that they have an escape plan for when they die; they are the ones who know how to get out of here and go to heaven (a better place)." How would you define what a Christian is? What was the purpose of Jesus' coming into the world?

The message of Scripture, the mission of Jesus, and the Gospel that we are meant to proclaim all center around a few things:

- Confronting God's people with their God-given destiny.
 Read Matthew 5:14-16
- 2) People living in such a way that they bring heaven, God's rule and reign, to earth. *Read Matthew 6:9-10*

 The message of salvation, repentance, hope, and new life is directed at those who claim to know who God is. Jesus goes to religious people and calls them to the life they claim to be living.

This week's Gospel statement says this: "The Gospel is the good news that although we have a natural tendency to live and walk in darkness, our God has sought us and called us to Himself through the work of Jesus; He now sends us out to be His light in the world." How do you see your life as light in the world? How do you understand your calling?

Over and over, passages in the Bible show that God's intention is not just to bring us back, but to bring us back for the purpose of restoration, so that we may become His light to everyone. *What do you think it means to be an image bearer of God*?

PRAYER

- Thank God that He gives us something to do and be His image bearers
- Ask God to deepen your understanding of what it means to be His image bearer
- Thank God for not giving up on us and bringing us back home to Him
- Ask Jesus to reveal to you where those around you need His light and where you can bring it
- Ask God to remind you daily of your own salvation so you can be motivated and humble

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GOSPEL TRUTH:

"The Gospel is the good news that even though we have segregated ourselves from God and others, God has not left us in that state; Jesus has come and liberated us through His death and resurrection to restore our broken relationship with God and others." **RE-WRITE IT IN YOUR OWN WORDS:**

DAILY DEVOTIONALS

Monday

I Peter 2:16 Live as people who are free, not using your freedom as a cover-up for evil, but living as servants of God. How have we (or you specifically) used your freedom for evil?

Matt 11:4-5 And Jesus answered them, "Go and tell John what you hear and see: the blind receive their sight and the lame walk, lepers are cleansed and the deaf hear, and the dead are raised up, and the poor have good news preached to them. How is Jesus' freedom good news even when it is abused?

Wednesday

Psalm 33:20 Our soul waits for the Lord; he is our help and our shield. How has God shown Himself to be a helper to you?

Thursday

Gen 1:27 So God created man in his own image, in the image of God he created him; male and female he created them. How are those of the opposite sex made in the image of God, just like you?

Friday

Luke 8:1-3 Soon afterward he went on through cities and villages, proclaiming and bringing the good news of the kingdom of God. This proclamation was to ALL people. Who do you have a hard time telling about the Gospel?

Saturday

Joel 2:28-29 "And it shall come to pass afterward, that I will pour out my Spirit on all flesh; your sons and your daughters shall prophesy, your old men shall dream dreams, and your young men shall see visions. Even on the male and female servants in those days I will pour out my Spirit. Who is the least likely person in your life to follow Jesus? Pray for them (right now).



This week we looked at how Jesus, as God in the flesh, welcomed all people into His family. Many religious people, then and now, tend to view people with issues as beneath them or unworthy of their time or respect. In the ancient world, this could happen because someone was poor or even the wrong gender (female, in case you were wondering)... something most people had no control over.

The Gospel reminds us that God has opened wide His arms to all us, so much so that He died for the sins of what people call "the least of these." Who are you most apt to judge as being "less than" yourself? How does this get displayed in your attitudes towards others? When was the last time you had an impression of someone that ended up being wrong?

In God's eyes, all mankind was made to be worshippers; women were made to neither rule over nor be ruled by men. God made people as equal image bearers to be loved by God and steward His creation *together*. In the forward momentum of the Scriptures, Jesus' coming shows us what God always intended: a whole class of people (that the world assumed was worthless) being given dignity and value. As a group, how can we better speak of truth and equality as found in the Gospel, both individually and together as a group? Does welcoming others mean approving of their choices? Why or why not? How can we welcome and love, while still trusting God for ultimate truth?

God has done this with all of humanity. He continues to show that He is the one calling us home; He is the one who is restoring us. Think about the racists in the Deep South during the 1800s (and even today). What will change hearts isn't arguments...what will change them is the Gospel, the good news of God's rescue and redemption because He made *all* people in His image. Jesus welcomed the losers, those with broken bodies, those with broken families, those who saw their culture as better than others, those who saw themselves as better than others, those who saw their gender as better than others, and more...and every time, it is the message of God's grace that refocuses these people from themselves to where they belong – Jesus.

The message of the Gospel helps us to truly see what God wants us, as His image bearers, to see! *What do you think God wants to see from you right now?*

PRAYER

- Thank God that He gives us someone other than ourselves to focus upon
- Ask God to reveal the places where judgment has kept us from sharing the Gospel
- Ask God how to live out the change He is making in us because of the Gospel
- Read Philippians 2:5-8. Thank God for giving us not just atonement for our sins in Jesus, but also our example of what the Gospel tangibly looks like
- Thank God for inviting you into His family

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11: Welcoming All

Gospel Statement

The Gospel is the good news that even though sin separates us from God and others, God didn't leave us that way. He sent His son Jesus, whose death on a cross and resurrection now allow us to be in restored relationship with God and those around us.

Family Questions

- 1. What does it mean to say something is true?
- 2. Is there any such thing as absolute truth? How can we measure whether something is true or not, based on God's plan?
- 3. Who in your life/school/work is seen as lesser of a person than you? Are you contributing to that perception through your own behaviors? How can you change that today?

WEEK TWELVE: Dying For Us

GOSPEL TRUTH:

"The Gospel is the good news that Jesus has come in fulfillment of all of God's promises in the Old Testament to provide a way for us to come into the Kingdom of God by removing our sin through dying on a cross and rising from the grave; He has restored and redeemed us to be His people in the world by His sacrifice."

RE-WRITE IT IN YOUR OWN WORDS:

Conversation Starter

Talk about truth and how society is altering truth to mean whatever we want it to mean. What does that do to us as a people? How can you as a family rail against that trend?

DAILY DEVOTIONALS

Monday

Galatians 3:14 (NIV) He redeemed us in order that the blessing given to Abraham might come to the Gentiles through Christ Jesus. How have you seen God's undeserved blessings given to you?

Tuesday

I Peter 3:18 (NIV) For Christ died for sins once for all, the righteous for the unrighteous, to bring you to God. How is Jesus' death good news for us?

Wednesday

I Peter 3:18 For Christ also suffered once for sins, the righteous for the unrighteous, that he might bring us to God, being put to death in the flesh but made alive in the spirit... How has God brought you back to true life?

Thursday

Matthew 13:44-46"The kingdom of heaven is like treasure hidden in a field, which a man found and covered up, Then in his joy he goes and sells all that he has and pays for the field." How much have you given up for the Kingdom of God? Is it worth everything to you?

Friday

Matthew 6:33 But seek first the kingdom of God and His righteousness, and all these things will be added to you. What are the top 3 priorities (in order) in your life right now?

Saturday

John 18:36 Jesus answered, "My kingdom is not of this world. If my kingdom were of this world, my servants would have been fighting, that I might not be delivered over to the Jews. But my kingdom is not from the world."

How can our lives be properly reordered so that Jesus is first?



Gospel Statement

The Gospel is the good news that Jesus has come to keep all of God's promises that we read about in the Old Testament through sending his son, Jesus, to die on the cross and rise from the dead. Jesus paid for the sins we have in our lives. Through Jesus, we are changed so that we can be His people and show the world what He has done for us.

Family Questions

- 1. When you think of God, what is He like?
- 2. What is something that you would give everything you own for? What is something you would die for?

Conversation Starter

Talk to your kids about what kind of a sacrifice it would be to have one of your children pay the price of death for someone else. Compare that to what God must have felt through the sending of His son, Jesus.



This week in the church calendar is called Holy Week or Passion Week, and is celebrated as the time leading up to the cross and crucifixion of Jesus. The cross becomes the culmination of all salvific human history, because it is the moment, at least in human time, that the sin of all of us was laid upon Jesus. There is nothing more important than the death and resurrection of Jesus. Without Jesus, there is no eternal life, no forgiveness of sin, and no relationship with a good and holy God. The Gospel is the good news that it is God who reconciles us to Himself; we don't pay for our sin—Jesus does.

Salvation means we are saved from God's wrath and our own sin. As a group, define the word "sin." Why does God have anger towards sin? What is it about sin that causes relationship with God to be torn and destroyed? How have you personally experienced this kind of relational damage?

The death and resurrection of Jesus brings restoration of the Kingdom and God into our lives. In John 3, Jesus tells Nicodemus how we get to become part of God's kingdom. In Matthew 13, Jesus shows how much it costs in terms of worth and value. In Matthew 6, Jesus shows us what the Kingdom brings in terms of restoration. In Matthew 10, Jesus shows how to get there (by giving up all that we are for all that He is).

People in the Scriptures seem very happy to welcome Jesus when He does what they want Him to do; but when He follows His own agenda, they reject Him and crucify him. How are we just like the crowds in Jerusalem during the last week of Jesus' life? How do we reject Jesus? What happens when Jesus' agenda is different than our own? How do we respond? When was the last time this happened to some in your GC? How did it work out?

A proper view of the Gospel can bring many things, including:

- *Hope* Our circumstances are not the final word; Jesus always has the final word
- The ability to yield ourselves to the will of the Father Our hearts can grow in submission and more in line with God's desires, rather than our own
- *Clarity of the love of God* We understand that the only thing constraining Jesus to his torture and execution was His love for us
- **Freedom** We do not need to know the future, because we know God holds the future in His hands

What is the greatest blessing you have experienced because of the Gospel? How do you live out that blessing in front of others?

- Thank God for Jesus' atoning death on the cross
- Thank God for His goodness in saving you
- Ask God that you would live in the humble reality that He took care of what separated you from Him
- Ask God to give you greater clarity of His love
- Thank God for His continual chasing and rescuing of us

GOSPEL TRUTH:

"The Gospel is the powerful news that by conquering death and resurrecting from the grave, Jesus is redeeming both individual lives and the whole earth back to the way of life God intended it to be; He has given us authority and power to partner with Him to renew all things by His Spirit."

DAILY DEVOTIONALS

Monday

This week was Easter, and we talked about resurrection and new life (you probably saw that coming). When we talk about resurrection—the "He is not here, but has risen"—we have to talk about what the Gospel means for us today. Too many people today think the Gospel is about what happens *after* we die; we think resurrection is life *after* this life. Resurrection, for sure, includes those things, but it transcends life after death; it is eternal life that starts now, today. Resurrection is something that lies at the heart of the Christian story, the Gospel—it is so much more than "life after death."

Resurrection does not mean a disembodied evacuation to some other place; it's about this world, this life, and it is physical. What do you think is the importance of the resurrection of Jesus? How does the resurrection speak to our hope being true and tangible? Read 1 Corinthians 15:3-6. Explain that this was one of the Church's earliest creeds, probably used within the first three years. Why is this creed so central to Christianity?

N.T. Wright wrote, "If Easter means Jesus Christ is only raised in a spiritual sense, then Easter is only about me and finding a new dimension in my personal spiritual life. But if Jesus Christ is truly risen from the dead, Christianity becomes good news for the whole world, not just for me...Easter means that in a world where injustice, violence, and degradation are endemic, God is not prepared to tolerate any such thing, and that we will work and plan with all the energy of God to implement the victory of Jesus over them all. Take away Easter and Karl Marx is right to accuse Christianity of ignoring the problems of the material world. Take away Easter and Freud was right to say Christianity is wish-fulfillment. Take away Easter, and Nietzsche was right to say it was for wimps." But with the resurrection being true, the Gospel sends us on a mission not just to proclaim what God has done, but also to make a difference now!

How does the truth of the Gospel spur you to see the world differently? Has the resurrection ever caused you to make a difference somewhere? How could this truth be a powerful motivator to begin to see and live differently?

Resurrection is not the end. It is the new beginning of a redeemed world and redeemed humanity. We get redeemed from our old life and restored to what God intended. Resurrection says, **"He is not here, but has risen,"** which means tomorrow doesn't have to be the same...it can be different! When you have eyes to see it, you become astounded at the power of God and the reality of His Gospel.

- Thank God for Jesus' resurrection and that new life is given to us as well
- Ask Jesus to reveal to you a passion for His work in the world based upon His work in you
- Ask God to show you tangible ways the resurrection makes a difference in the world
- Thank God that He has decided to use you in bringing about His message
- Thank God that the resurrection is as true today as it was when Jesus rose





Gospel Statement

The Gospel is the powerful news that by conquering death and rising from the dead, Jesus is saving not only people's lives, but the whole earth. He is going to change all things back to the original plan, and we can be a part of that plan through Jesus!

Family **Questions**

- 1. What does it mean for us that the veil in the temple was torn from top to bottom?
- 2. Pretend you are a reporter. What does a reporter gather? What facts can you gather about Jesus' resurrection?
- 3. How do all the facts we know about the resurrection point to the truth of the Gospel?

GOSPEL TRUTH:

"The Gospel is the good news that Jesus died and rose from death for our redemption and He promises a future hope in Him where there is nothing we will miss in this life that does not find its fulfillment in Him, because we will have all eternity to experience Him."

Conversation Starter

Talk about the resurrection. What fact discussed this week stands out the most to each member in your family?

14: New People



Gospel Statement

The Gospel is the good news that Jesus died and rose from death to save us, and He promises a future hope in Him that will be all that we could want and need forever with God!

Family **Questions**

- 1. What is a slave? How can we be a slave even though no other person owns us? To what do you see yourself as a slave?
- 2. What does it mean to redeem? How does Jesus redeem us?

Conversation Starter

Talk about what you think Heaven will be like with Jesus. Use descriptions, think about people you would like to see, questions you would like to ask. Do you see yourself in that picture? Does it seem like your future? Talk about this with your family.



This week, we talked about how the crucifixion and resurrection of Jesus was not the end, but the continuation of the Gospel. The Gospel is ongoing in how God works in the world. We are not a people who are missing out, or have missed out, on anything...we are a people who have all the riches of God in our hands, and we get to distribute freely and generously in terms of money, time, joy, hope, and reconciliation.

We are a people who get to live in a new identity given to us by God; this new identity rewrites our own story in terms of God's story for us. How do you define your identity and how did you come to that definition? How does that identity determine how you live out your life? Could a new/different identity make you live or see the world differently?

We are told that we will run and not be weary. We are told that we will walk and not faint. We are meant to understand that we won't look back on anything and say, "Oh, I wish I were younger or I wish I were more beautiful." Timothy Keller says, "You were nothing compared to what you're going to be like. Compared to what you're going to be in the future, you were a vegetable." We are told we will have no regrets, no fears, and no problem with service and sacrifice, because

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our future is a physical future fulfilled in Jesus. Our future has been promised by a God who promised Jesus, salvation, and redemption for millennia and brought it to pass. This same God promises to bring about our eternity as well.

When you think of eternity with God, what do you think of? How do you think "heaven" will play out for you personally? What are your hopes and fears about your eternal future?

Too many people look for everything they want in this life and think that if they get it, they have found redemption, but that is not true. The scriptures teach that our freedom and power are directly proportional to how much we are willing to admit we were (or are) slaves and sinners. Our joy and future hope are directly proportional to how willing we are to see our need for redemption.

Here is your Gospel statement for the coming week: "The Gospel is the good news that Jesus died and rose for our redemption and the promise of a future hope where we will lack nothing, experience complete fulfillment, and enjoy Him forever."

How willing are you to admit to your own sin in your life? How willing are you to see your need for redemption? What does that mean to you?

- Thank God for His promised future
- Ask Jesus to reveal to you your daily need to live in His hope for new life
- Ask God to show you your own sin as well as your need for redemption
- Ask God to give you a deeper understanding of the Gospel message
- Thank God that He brings all things to fruition

ACT F I V E: CHURCH

"They too, were going to be sent out to herald the good news of the true King's life, death, and resurrection."

After His death and resurrection Jesus gathered His followers back together. He began to show them from their history and their sacred writings that what had happened to Him was all according to plan. God was still on a redemptive mission, and He was sending them out to announce His reign to the world.

Over the next 40 days Jesus showed them that His death and resurrection were needed to:

- Take the penalty for their sin on Himself.
- Defeat Satan.
- Redeem them from their slavery to sin.
- Secure the renewal of His creation.

Jesus' friends couldn't have been more excited. They were sitting there in Jerusalem with Jesus, the one and true resurrected King. He was teaching them. He was about to take His throne and usher in the end of history. Finally, what they had been waiting, hoping, and longing for was finally here!

Not so fast. Jesus told Peter, John and the others that it was not yet time, the story wasn't finished yet. There were more people who still needed to hear this good news about the victorious king and His good Kingdom. It was not yet time for His Kingdom to come in full. Jesus' disciples learned that they and their friends were going to be sent out into the world as ambassadors. Just as those angels had heralded the good news of the Jesus' birth so many years before... Just as Jesus had heralded the news of His Kingdom and showed people what life is like in His Kingdom....

They too, were going to be sent out to herald the good news of the true King's life, death, and resurrection. Together their lives and their voices would be a foretaste of an invitation into the Kingdom life.

Before He ascended, Jesus told His disciples, "I am leaving you now, but I will come again one day. But for now, while you are here, I will send the Spirit of God to live in and among you. He will empower you for your mission to bring the good news of Me and My Kingdom, making new disciples of Me in every nation." And then He left, ascending to the right hand of the Father.

Jesus' followers (about 120 of them) sat in Jerusalem waiting for the promised Spirit to empower them to live out the mission to which Jesus had called them into. They waited and prayed as days went by. Finally, on the tenth day, the Spirit arrived with a great rush of wind, and tongues of fire were seen leaping above their heads. They were united, empowered, and directed to live out the mission Jesus had given them. In order to tell all these different people, they were empowered to speak in languages that they had never spoken before in their lives—so that people could hear the good news.

At this time, there were many people coming into town because it was the time of Pentecost, a Jewish feast that drew people to Jerusalem from all over to celebrate the end of the spring harvest and God's grace in providing for them. When those people heard the great sound of the wind, they came rushing to see what was going on. Peter and his friends, empowered by the Spirit, started to connect the dots for people, showing how their longings for a Deliverer, a true and perfect King, were fulfilled in Jesus, the One whom they had killed. He was truly the Messiah, the Deliverer—and they had to repent and believe this good news. Thousands of people believed the true story that day.



As time went on, Jesus' disciples were sent out from Jerusalem. They spread all over the known world. They told as many people as they could about the one and true King and what He had done. They set up communities of people who believed and lived according to this true story wherever they went. These were called churches, and those who followed this King were called Christians. Jesus' followers began to orient all of their lives around this true story devoting their lives to serving each other, being a family that was not defined by cultural norms or racial boundaries but by their crucified and risen Savior, learning from the Scriptures and each other, and living as missionaries to the world.

Many of those who followed Jesus were exiled, tortured, and even murdered for living their lives according to the true story. But still the good news of a risen Savior spread, bringing freedom and forgiveness to people across the world. As the good news spread through the cities and out into rural communities people of all walks of life began to see the truth of the story. One such man, Saul, was a religious leader whose life mission was to kill these followers of Jesus. Saul encountered the risen Christ, and his life was transformed by the power of the gospel to the point that he became one of the main missionaries we learn from even today. (You might know him by his new name, Paul.)

As these communities spread across the world, some of Jesus' followers who had witnessed the risen Christ were directed by the Holy Spirit to write letters to these communities, teaching them how to live faithfully on mission. They answered their questions, corrected their errors, and redirected them back to Jesus and His mission which was now theirs to carry out by the power of the Spirit.

Through the church, we see that God is still on His redemptive mission. It is as the church lives out the mission to declare and demonstrate the gospel that people are able to see what it is to live under the good reign of God and come to worship King Jesus.

This is the act of the story in which we find ourselves today.

This week, we talked about how the reality of both Jesus' life and the Gospel are real and tangible for us living in the "real world." So often we want God to come and remake our entire lives so all of our mistakes simply disappear, but Jesus comes and walks with us through our mistakes so that we learn and grow from them. God doesn't take away our consequences for our sin; He takes away the eternal penalty for our sin by removing our shame and adopting us into His family.

The book of Hebrews addresses Christians living in an urban setting who were being marginalized because of their commitment to Jesus. The book essentially asks, "If God is so committed to our joy and His glory, if the Gospel teaches that He loves us so much, why is our life so hard?" Have you ever felt like life is hard? Why is that? What do you define as "hard?" Have you ever questioned God or His love in the midst of life being difficult?

The book of Hebrews essentially has an answer to this question. The answer of the book, in a nutshell, is *life is a journey*. The text tells us it's a journey from weariness into rest, from alienation into the presence of God; it tells us the only way we ever get home is the Gospel—it is fixing our eyes on Jesus. Hebrews walks through how Jesus is

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the fulfillment of God's good news, with Jesus as God's final word on the Gospel.

Read Hebrews 1:1-3. *How does a high view of Jesus affect our understanding of the call to be His representatives in the world?*

When we better understand who Jesus is, there are personal implications that should push us to extreme love and care for those around us; this means there are also global implications by how we live. N.T. Wright wrote, *"How can you live with the terrifying thought that the hurricane has become human, that fire has become flesh, that life itself came to life and walked into our midst? Christianity either means that, or it means nothing. It is either the most devastating disclosure of the deepest reality in the world, or it's a sham, a nonsense, a bit of deceitful playacting. Most of us, unable to cope with saying either of those things, condemn ourselves to live in the shallow world in between."*

How do you live in the shallow "in-between" world, instead of the jawdropping truth of Jesus? How do you start to drift in your life from Jesus' calling? How can we help each other come back to the central promises of the Gospel?

- Thank God that He was willing to take on flesh to rescue us
- Ask God to help you see Jesus as He truly is, full of grace, majesty, and power
- Ask Jesus to reveal to you where you are living in the "inbetween" rather than in the full understanding of God
- Thank Jesus for the hard places in your life that have caused you to grow
- Ask God to give you strength for when the next trial arises
- Thank God that He has already walked with you through your trials and promises to never leave you

15: Mission as Witness



Gospel Statement

The Gospel is the good news that Jesus came as God in the flesh to tell the good news of His grace, that only through Jesus can we be saved.

Family **Questions**

- 1. If you had to write a fictional story about the resurrection, what would it look like?
- 2. What does it say about the truth of the resurrection that those fantastical details and exciting twists and reactions aren't present in the Gospel accounts?
- 3. How can you use this information to help spread the Gospel?
- 4. Who is Jesus to you?

Conversation Starter

Tell your kids the story of your salvation. Include details such as who you were before you were saved, how you came to Jesus, and how Jesus has changed you. Encourage your kids to tell you their salvation stories, or if they don't have one yet, talk to them about why they should turn their lives over to Jesus. ACT SIX: RESTORATION "The story isn't over."

But the story isn't over. One of Jesus' followers, a man named John, was imprisoned on a small island. He sat in his prison cell and prayed to God. He wondered if and when God would rescue His people.

God spoke to him through a dream, a revelation. In a sequence of stories with rich imagery, God made John aware of the reality that God was still sovereignly accomplishing His mission on the earth through the Church. Even though God's people were suffering and it seemed like the enemy was winning, all was not lost. God revealed to John that He was actively accomplishing His purposes and that they would ultimately culminate in a full and final victory.

One day Jesus will return — not just as the sacrificial lamb that was slain, but as the conquering Lion. John paints this descriptive picture for us with rich imagery: Jesus will return on a great white warhorse like a mighty general returning from battle. He has a great sword of righteousness coming out of His mouth. He has a tattoo on His thigh that says "King of Kings and Lord of Lords." He is wearing a crown of many jewels. And He is wearing a brilliant white robe. And the hem of His robe has been drenched in blood.

Jesus will return for one final battle where He will finally and fully defeat Satan and the powers of darkness, sending them into a lake of fire where they will remain forever.

Then Jesus will judge every person. Those who decided to choose death, who rebelled against God's rule and never repented, will be cast away, forever missing out on God's renewed creation that is to come. Those who were a part of the redeemed community, who had been redeemed by the blood of Jesus, will spend forever with Him in what is to come...

And John saw it! He saw a picture of creation restored! He saw everything bad come undone:

- He saw all the effects of the curse, reversed.
- All the twisting of God's original intention, untwisted.
- All the tears, wiped away.
- Death, no more.
- No mourning, no crying, no pain.
- All the false idols, false gods, false saviors, given up to forever worship the true Savior.

He saw a picture of eternity. There were no clouds, no harps, no vague otherworldliness.

- There was a King.
- There was a renewed creation.
- There were people from every tribe, tongue, and nation bowing down and living their lives in worship to King Jesus.

Not only did he see it, but he heard it. He heard a mighty voice declare from the throne, "Behold, the dwelling place of God is with man. He will dwell with them, and they will be His people, and God Himself will be with them as their God. Behold I am making all things new!" (Revelation 21:3, 5)

Seeing and hearing all these things, John was again convinced that God is still on His mission. He knew that Jesus was using His Church to accomplish His purposes in His world. And nothing could thwart that.

John wrote down what he had seen and heard so that the rest of the Church could have the same hope, security, and urgency that he now had. He ended his writing with this, final words: "Amen. Come Lord Jesus!"

16: An Eternity



Gospel Statement

The Gospel is the good news of the present and future love of God; this love teaches us to live our lives here on earth by worshipping Jesus through everything we do, everywhere we go, and everyone we see, no matter if they are the same as, or different from us.

Family **Questions**

- 1. How do you, as a family, integrate the cultures you live in to bring others to Jesus?
- 2. What adjustments could you make to your behaviors that would allow for people who are *not* part of a church culture feel comfortable in having Gospel interactions?
- 3. How can you include every member of the family in everyday worship of sharing the good news?

Conversation Starter

Discuss as a family if your lives have a variety of cultures within your social circle. Do you spend time with people that don't believe as you do? How can you either include more diversity in your social circle, or minister to your social circle in a more effective way?



This week, we finish our series on the Gospel, the definitive news about what God has done to save us, by talking about our lives in terms of eternity. Part of what makes Christianity unique is its certainty of a material future that is God's future for us. God made creation good and promises to restore it, and us, by His grace, love, and the work of Jesus. The certainty of Jesus coming for our sake should override all other things in our lives; it should cause us to rest in hope and trust of who God is.

What we must also understand is that part of the beauty of the Gospel is to show how desperately we need one another as well as Jesus. As a group, discuss what you tend to put your hope in. Have you ever seen the diversity that is around you as a reason to have hope and grow? When someone has questioned you or pushed you about your faith, how have you responded? When was the last time someone disagreed with you and you thanked them for it?

The beauty of the Gospel and eternity is that we will worship and live with God in the midst of a community of diversity. The Scriptures teach that only together, when people from all different racial groups are reading, applying, and discussing Scripture, will we see all of the glory of what the Gospel is.

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We will know God better in a community of varying personalities and backgrounds. The Gospel teaches that we cannot walk away from the enormous amount of work it takes to study the Bible together, to worship together, to live together, to relate together, and to have fellowship together. Only together will we grasp the enormity of the Kingdom of God, the glory of God, and who Jesus is, because we will do it together for eternity.

Are you excited about eternity in community with Jesus? Scared? Intimidated? Why?

It is important for us to understand that on the cross, Jesus made an evaluation of us that called out our sin, but the beauty of the Gospel is that at the same moment, He was also making space in His life for us. He sacrificed so we could be in relationship with Him. The Gospel gives us the hope of the present and future love of God; we then get to turn around and give that same love to everyone else, no matter the race, no matter the culture. Who are the easiest and the hardest people to hang out with in your life and why?

The Gospel is the good news of the present and future love of God that teaches us to live eternity now by worshipping Jesus in all ways, and in redemptive relationship with others, no matter the race or culture.

- Thank God that He was willing to take the centuries it took to explain and bring the Gospel
- Ask God to remind you of the importance of the Gospel for now and eternity
- Ask Jesus to send people into your life that see the world differently for the purpose of building each other up in faith
- Ask Jesus to convict you in the places where you don't want to do the hard work of true community and friendship with others
- Thank God for how He has never given up on us in love

Appendix A: Salvation

It is our desire for everyone to live a life that is fully surrendered to the all-empowering Lordship of Jesus Christ. We hope that going through the past sixteen weeks have helped you better grasp your own need for a Savior. Our hope was and is to show in a real way that without the work of Jesus and the Cross, our sin completely separates us from our Creator – the Good and Gracious God of all, but it is His plan, from the beginning, to bring Healing and Redemption to this broken relationship.

If you have come to an understanding of your need for Jesus to save you, you might be asking, "What does this mean?" or, "What do I do now?" We wanted to end this book by helping you walk through surrendering to Jesus for the first time.

A big word in Christian understanding is "surrender." In America we don't like the word much because it sounds like giving up, like we have lost, but in terms of the Good News of Jesus it means we are giving up living for ourselves and instead trusting in Jesus for everything that matters in our lives. Jesus surrendered Himself to death on a cross when He died, which means the cross should change our self-image. Without the cross, we have nothing except sin in our lives, but because of the reality of the cross, Jesus is our righteousness, redeemer, and our peace. We have a firm foundation to live and to base our lives upon, His death paying for our sins and His resurrection giving life back to us.

The good news of Jesus is that He has made us new, so really, what does that mean? James 1:22 But be doers of the word, and not hearers only...or James 2:18 But someone will say, "You have faith and I have works." Show me your faith apart from your works, and I will show you my faith by my works. James is not advocating a works-based salvation, he is steering us to the understanding that when we comprehend what Jesus did to save us, our entire lives become one of loving Him by living in ways that honor Him. Paul echoes these words in *Romans* 12:1 "I appeal to you

therefore, brothers, by the mercies of God, to present your bodies as a living sacrifice, holy and acceptable to God, which is your spiritual worship." When we understand God's great mercy given to us, we begin to live differently. Do you see how it all fits together?

The Bible is full of stories of people who knew God and yet did some pretty horrible things. We could actually find some comfort there. Many of us have found ourselves in a place far from God after having come to know Him. Jesus tells the story that we call "The Prodigal Son" in Luke 15:11-32 (you should go read it now). What you will notice in this story is that the prodigal decides to come home in the story when he remembers the kindness of his father. The same is true for us. We need to remember the goodness of our heavenly Father if we ever hope to live lives that honor God. It's true that people who seek to trust and follow Jesus can fall/walk into sin (either suddenly or as the result of a series of steps in the wrong direction), and without a doubt, all of us struggle with sin (even the writers of Scripture did so). When we forget God's goodness, we start to live, all the time, in the land of disobedience and then stay there defending it as being no big deal, but according to the Bible, it IS a big deal because our obedience will come out of our understanding of who He is!

We are called, even today, to be those who believe in Jesus, to live as He gives us strength to live, and to honor Him and glorify Him in all things...why? Because for those of whose lives are surrendered to Christ and His truth, the cross and salvation are returned to their rightful place at the center of the gospel. We have hope because we understand God's love and hope for us... which also means that evangelism, how we treat others, and obedience once again, becomes the defining mark of what it means to love God.

The growth of the disciples looked something like this: First they had faith in Jesus; then they began to have the faith of Jesus, then they began to think more like Jesus. Elton Trueblood in his book <u>A Place To Stand</u> wrote some profoundly true words, he said:

"Part of the weakness of the Christian movement in our generation has been the relative lack of emphasis on belief. There are three areas that must be cultivated if any faith is to be a living faith: the inner life of devotion, the intellectual life of rational thought, and the outer life of human service. There is no doubt as to which of these has been most neglected in our time; it is the emphasis upon rational belief." He then later says, "The deepest conviction of the Christian is that Christ was not wrong."

Faith involves certain beliefs. Faith involves an attitude of hope and confidence. But at its core, faith is trusting a person. We certainly do want you to trust Jesus for eternity, but we also want you to trust Him in your daily life, moment by moment. This is why we have spent 16 weeks talking about God's over-arching story, and finding our place in that Story. In every moment and area of life, we are living the story of God! It is hard to live as Jesus would live if we do not share at the core level His convictions about the way things really are. The way things are is that there is God who is committed to us in love, that has done much work throughout history to bring us to Himself, and that you are one of those called to belong to Him.

If you have more questions or would like to discuss further with someone, here are three next steps:

- Continue to read the Scriptures! Start with Matthew and read the four gospels back to back. Ask the Holy Spirit to continue to reveal Jesus to you and the truth of how things really are.
- Continue to join us at Element on Sundays and talk to one of our leaders who would be happy to answer any questions you have to the best of his/her ability.
- Get connected with a Gospel Community. A group of people who share their lives together centered on the person and work of Jesus Christ. Following Jesus is an allof-life process, and the best way to grow is by being involved in other people's lives, and by having them in your life, walking and growing together.
