Story Within The Story Week One: Providence – Ruth 1:1

Ruth is a book of Providence and Redemption. In one sense all of the Bible is about God's Providence and Redemption, but it is very strongly pronounced in Ruth; it is one of the reasons we are calling the series <u>"The Story Within the Story."</u> All of our stories find meaning and hope within God's larger story of us. "Providence" simply means God's care and guidance over His creation, but when it comes to our lives we should have an understanding that He knows all that has been done to us and all that we have done...and that He can make things work out for His glory and our ultimate joy.

Providence is also seen in the story of Joseph in how he was sold into slavery by his brothers (because of Joseph's knuckleheadedness and his brother's jealousy.) Joseph becomes a slave in a foreign household, gets unjustly accused of rape, and spends the majority of his prime years in prison, yet still helps others. Eventually one of the people he helps in prison remembers him when Pharaoh has dream that needs to be interpreted. Joseph interprets the dream, rises in prominence, and oversees the salvation of an entire country during a famine. When Joseph reunites with his brothers they are worried he will have them killed; this is when Joseph says the most providential words in the bible: *Genesis 50:20 "You intended to harm me, but God intended it for good to accomplish what is now being done, the saving of many lives."*

This then becomes the story of Ruth; how God came to redeem and restore an entire people.

Ruth was a Moabite, an entire people loosely related to the Israelites that were the product of incest. The Israelites hated the Moabites and the Moabites hated the Israelites; this hatred was multigenerational in nature. In the end, God will take one of the hated Moabites and make them the great grandmother of one of Israel's greatest kings...and also the ancestor of Jesus. The story of Ruth is meant to remind us that our past doesn't have to decide our future and whatever curse you may feel upon your life can and will be broken by the grace of God. Jesus, because He is God, can bring hope to any situation because the Gospel is true and all things rest in the providential hand of God.
