X. GOD'S WILL IS HARD TO FIND.

Isaiah 55:9 "Or as the heavens are higher than the earth, so are my ways higher than your ways and my thoughts than your thoughts."

Have you noticed that when it comes time to make a major decision, most of us experience a heightened interest in discovering God's will? We all seek prayer (when we should be doing that anyway), we seek spiritual conversations (when we should be doing that anyway), and we listen for God more intently (when we should be doing that anyway).

When making a choice about a new job opportunity, selecting a college, determining the future of a romantic relationship, or deciding where to live, we don't want to blow it; so we seek God's will with extra fervor. We pray for it, ask about it, search for it. All in the hopes that it will become clear what God wants us to do.

Most people live with the sense that God's will is both important AND elusive.

- It's important for obvious reasons. Any time God has a specific plan or a preference in mind, only a fool ignores it and a bigger fool defies it.
- But Is God's will elusive? Most of God's will is spelled out in black and white. It's not hidden.

The problem stems from a concept many of us have been taught from birth, that is that God has a highly detailed blueprint for our life (which is true and untrue). We think God's plan includes a specific and preordained job, career, house, spouse, car-and everything in between. As a result, we spend a lot of time looking for that special person, place, or thing that we think God has set aside just for us. We have confused freedom and legalism, we have confused God's omniscience with His divine will.

We confuse "blueprint" in God's eyes with a blueprint like we use it. A blueprint contains a specific set of instructions that spell out everything in detail. It's so specific that anyone with the ability to read and follow a set of plans can build exactly what the architect had in mind. You don't mess with blueprints. You follow them. For many of us, this is our metaphor of God's will, but in doing so we take away the freedom God intends for us to have.

The overarching theme of our lives is to glorify God.

- Westminster catechism Question I: What is the chief and highest end of man?
- Answer: Man's chief and highest end is to glorify God, and fully to enjoy him forever.

God cares more about HOW YOU WORK than where you work. God cares more about HOW YOU LIVE more than where you live. God cares more about HOW YOU TREAT YOUR SPOUSE than who you marry. In the New Testament there is almost no emphasis on the kinds of decisions we seem to always stress over, instead, the primary emphasis is on godly character and daily obedience as our pattern of life.

When faced with a decision we should pray and check the Scriptures and ask God for His specific input. When God leads we do what He says even if it is difficult...but don't be surprised when the leading is more in HOW you conduct yourself.

BASICS OF GOD'S WILL

- **1)** Obey What You Know The starting place for finding God's will is obeying the commands and instructions we already know.
- 2) Get the Facts (As Many As Possible) You have to use your brain. Proverbs 19:2 Desire without knowledge is not good, and whoever makes haste with his feet misses his way. Biblical faith is not illogical. It doesn't deny or ignore the facts.
- 3) Think Biblically It's hard to follow God's plan/will if we don't know the Scriptures (what they actually say, as opposed to what we might think they say). It does us no good to try and do what Jesus would do if we have no idea what Jesus actually did.
- **4)** Master the Basics There are some fundamentals we have to master and they are found in the Scriptures. They tell us explicitly what God wants us to do or not do in any situation: tell the truth, be kind, repay good for evil, serve, honor, pray, and give.
