# WEEK 8 THE ALCHEMY OF JOY

Paul writes the letter to the Philippian church while chained to guards in Rome. He reminds the Philippians how to find joy even in difficult circumstances. He will demonstrate that with the right definition of life ("to live is Christ"), any circumstance can be transformed by God into something meaningful. Like an alchemist turning lead to gold, God uses our trials both for His glory and our spiritual growth. Paul shows that true joy comes not from our circumstances, but from having Christ as our ultimate purpose and prize.

**Paul's hardships teach us to look to Jesus.** The Philippians are in danger of being discouraged *because* Paul was in prison and Paul is saying, "Don't be discouraged because of my imprisonment." Following, trusting, and believing in God gives us reason to look at hardship in a different way, a way that teaches us to learn from our circumstance. Paul asked the question of "why" in hardship; his answer comes from understanding God's work.

**The alchemy of life and joy.** Paul will say, "I know that as bad as this is, it's working both historical good and personal good." Matthew Henry comments that what Paul says works through all circumstances in life to turn lead in to gold. Though Paul sees only a glimmer of what God is doing, he also doesn't expect to see the whole picture because He knows God is so much higher and greater than he could imagine. There is an anticipation of hope in the midst of suffering that asks, "How does this become gold?"

**Phil 1:21** For to me to live is Christ, and to die is gain. Paul says, "I may live. I may die. It doesn't matter."

The word "salvation" in the New Testament is used in different tenses.

- Past tense we are saved from the penalty of sin.
- Present tense we have been saved from the penalty of sin, but we are being saved now from the power and the effects of sin in our lives.
- Future eventually, we will be saved from the very presence of sin.

Paul says, "I rejoice because I know that suffering and tragedy, whether I end up facing execution or not, is making me more like my Savior." God is sanctifying Paul through it, turning Paul into (metaphorical) gold.

**Our life's definition.** Paul says, "I expect and hope that what has happened to me will turn out for my salvation." Why? *Phil 1:21 For to me to live is Christ, and to die is gain.* That is the definition of his life; it should be the proper definition of *all* life, because when it is, we will be able to face anything. Paul says there is only one definition of life that enables us to stand in the day of hardship: *Phil 1:21 For to me to live is Christ, and to die is gain.* 

A different dynamic of life. John 17:19, And for their sake I consecrate myself, that they also may be sanctified in truth. In response to that Christians should say: Phil 1:21 For to me to live is Christ, and to die is gain.
