

We are doing a series at Element where we are answering questions that people asked us at the end of last year. Many of you have expressed that you have enjoyed this series because it shows the heart of where Element is at in their thinking right now in regard to God and grace.

Out of the last 13 weeks, if you have been here for it, what has stood out to you the most?

Is there any lingering question you would like answered?

If God is a God of love, as clearly shown by Jesus, the What in the World question is: [then why] "did God command genocide?" This week's question comes about beacuse of a focus in our culture where people want to discount God's soveriegn goodness. Many people today see a disparity between the God of the Old Testament and who Jesus portrays God to be in the New Testament. This disparity is not something Jesus Himself would have said was there as He held the Old Testament as authoritative and true, and that God has always been the same "yesterday, today, and forever."

Have you ever thought the God displayed in the Old Testament was different than the one that Jesus spoke about? How/why? Do you still think that?

We learned in the message that God is not like us in that fact that while God can be very angry, God doesn't fall apart like us, act irrationally like us, or "see red" like us; He <u>cannot</u> sin. God is all powerful and all good and perfectly loving...so would He really sanction genocide?! What in the world?! Remember, we can't possibly understand Old Testament stories of war and destruction without knowing who God is. The truth is that God is perfect in His wisdom (omniscience), power (omnipotence), and love (omnipresence).

In what way does learning more about God's wisdom bring clarity to your own circumstances?

Do you believe God is all powerful?

How do you feel about God when you think about His power? (Overwhelmed? Comforted? Scared? Safe?)

The Israelites cherished the command to love God first and most because God wants to be loved; not because of a deficiency in His character, but because it is what HE DOES...He loves. When we read accounts in the Old Testament about destruction and wars, the end goal was for God's people to have a nation where He could be displayed in a true way.

Read Romans 8:38-39.

Does knowing that God is with you all the time, no matter what you do or where you go, make you feel loved? Why or why not?

Think about a 3-legged stool: one leg represents God's infinite wisdom, the second leg represents His absolute power, and the third leg is God's endless love. This stool taken as a whole represents our faith. If we are struggling with our view of God, we are usually questioning either God's wisdom, power, or love. And a 3-legged stool will wobble and collapse if one leg is weak.

Share a situation or area in your life where you find your faith tottering – which leg of the stool needs support? How can your Gospel Community help with growing your faith?

If we are confused or perplexed by stories we read because of hard things we experience, we can trust God's omniscience, omnipotence, and omnipresence. And the great news, the heart of the Gospel, is that Jesus lived, died, and rose again in order that we can be 100% confident in who God is and what He does in our lives. This week, let's look for ways to pull up our stools of faith together and see God for who He is: all wise, all powerful, and all loving.
